

Breastfeeding Friendly Workplace is Welcome at Local Businesses in Dunklin County

INTRODUCTION

Dunklin County-has a population of 37,778 and a staggering 26.71% of families have incomes that are below the poverty level. The amount of women that receive prenatal care is descending and the average number of births annually at Twin Rivers Regional Hospital is around 400.

Currently, there is only one OB/GYN in all of Dunklin County. Many pregnant women seek medical care through a primary care physician and delay their OB/GYN visits until their last trimester. Additionally, 47% of pregnant women in Dunklin County being served by WIC had limited knowledge of breastfeeding. Only 3.89% fully breastfed ,6.11% partially breastfed and 42.78% postpartum. Based upon these low numbers, we wanted to increase awareness of the nutritional benefits of breastfeeding for the child and the mothers health.

PROJECT OVERVIEW

When first starting this grant we had only one person currently as a Certified Lactation Counselor (CLC). However, we now have 4 and will be sending 2 more nurses from the hospital to become certified. Assisting the nurses to become CLC's helps with the encouragement of the women that deliver and possibly become a WIC participant as a breastfeeding mother. While we are encouraging and making mothers more aware of breastfeeding, we also wanted to make them feel more comfortable in the community while breastfeeding. We worked with many businesses and currently have 6 businesses in Dunklin County that are now a Breastfeeding Friendly Workplace!

Increasing the number of new businesses that publicly promote/welcome breastfeeding in the target community. We had initially set out to do 1 mental health business and 2 Walmart businesses. However, we were able to exceed our initial goals and reach other local businesses by word of mouth, making in-person visits, and placing the successes in the newspaper to create awareness of our project in the local community.

As an additional incentive, local business could receive a grant up to \$500 through the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services to help create or improve lactation support policies and programs at their worksite.

ACTIVITIES

Key activities involved:

- Providing assistance with paperwork to become Breastfeeding Friendly Certified.
- Placing signs, pop-up banners, and posters in businesses that welcome breastfeeding or are a Breastfeeding Friendly Workplace
- Handouts provided to the hospital and WIC staff that will visually help breastfeeding moms.
- Broadcasting radio ads that support breastfeeding.
- Designed prescription pads for a referral system that works collaboratively with providers, the hospital, schools, mental health, and the health department to help increase better assistance with nutrition education for pregnant women, breastfeeding mothers, and heath insurance assistance.





OUTCOMES

There are currently 5 Breastfeeding Friendly Workplaces in Dunklin County, but more businesses are interested in becoming Breastfeeding Friendly and working on their paperwork or lactation room. We highlight the business in the newspaper after getting certified so that the community is aware of this when walking into their business!



LESSONS LEARNED

- The opportunities for WIC to partner with other organizations to promote community health.
- Community involvement allows WIC staff to provide better resources to participants resulting in healthier outcomes.
- Challenges will be met along the way such as scheduling conflicts and time constraints, but progress can still be made towards achieving your goals and objectives.
